

The Lord is at hand; do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. Philippians 4:5b-6

We are in troubling times. Wars, struggles, and uncertainty about so much shake the very ground many of us attempt to walk upon. It can often be hard to see, in times like these, that God is even working.... let alone be thankful during this season of expected gratitude. Yet, it is times just like these which require the greatest leaps of faith, fueled by hope, and laced up with thanksgiving. These are the times which call us to *choose* gratitude.

This Bible study was first written in the trying times of the 2020 Thanksgiving season, as newsheads declared, "Thanksgiving is Cancelled" and people worldwide struggled to understand truth, lies, fear and revelation. So similar to right now... in 3 years, not much has changed. At that time, God kept slipping verses from Philippians in front of me. I felt a tug in my Spirit: *write a gratitude study for the book of Philippians*. In typical Amanda-mode, instead of just saying, "OK", I countered with, "But Philippians isn't about gratitude, the theme is traditionally known as 'The Joy Filled Life'" But God persisted.

Still, instead of simple submission with "OK, Lord.", I decided to do an internet search: "Books of the Bible Focused on gratitude" and the number one result from the New Testament: Colossians! A book replete with "gratitude" and "Thankfulness" and "Thanksgiving" verses. Whereas, Philippians actually ranked among the lowest of the Epistles in the category of Thanksgiving.

So, again, I asked, "Are you *sure* Lord, people will think I'm crazy for writing a gratitude study on a book which does not contain that expressed theme." But, again, God persisted. Even after a quick read through of Colossians to 'prove my point', my brain only remembered Philippians. However, I have tried often enough in my life to challenge God's edicts to know; nothing else would *fit* or reflect God's movement unless I simply obeyed.

Do you every do that? Go left just to 'see' what is over there when God has already said "Go right"?!

I share all that as part testimony and part explanation. You, too, may not think "gratitude" or "thanksgiving" (outside of verse 4:6) when you think of Philippians... or perhaps you do. What I *can* testify to is; as I began putting my outline together I understood God's pull to share a study on gratitude out of the book of Philippians and I can admit, a "Joy-filled life" is certainly intertwined with a heart of thanksgiving... a theme which seems to move as an under-current to the whole of this timeless letter.

It helps, too, knowing how Philippians was written by the Apostle Paul WHILE in prison at the time (and yet he does not appear to be resentful or depressed about his situation) to a church he expresses fond feelings for. It holds a repeated message of joy, humility, thanksgiving, and rejoicing. Amid these key points, some commentators suggest we may also see Paul offering *resources to help through suffering*.

Whether intentional or as a biproduct of the joy Paul continually discusses here, *help through suffering* is most definitely found when one slows down and really takes time to look at this text and what Paul's encouragement is subtly saying.



I have written other studies on Philippians for local groups in the past, however, this one is different from any I have shared both here and locally before.

- → I've tried to make the content of each lesson condensed for quick study in case you have busy days ahead in November. *However*, don't let this set-up hold you back from additional scouring of the text. I will leave extra space on each page for either writing out prayers or in case you would like to do cross-referencing or digging on your own. You can also use the backside of each day's study for notes or set up a notebook or binder for the overflow. (I like to set up binders for each of my studies: inserted with a print-out of the study and additional notebook paper and cross-reference notes and articles I may find on the internet and print off.)
- → At each day's start, I am prompting with a few quick questions to draw out some key points I felt God laying on my heart to notice. I am using an ESV if you are using a different version you can still find the answers but some questions may be a bit confusing because of text arrangement (especially if your version of choice is KJV). Both biblehub.com and biblegateway.com are great resources for parallel referencing. I will also include the ESV text for Philippians at the end of this study packet in case you want it on hand and/or you wish to highlight and notate text as you go.
- → A new approach I started back in 2020 within my private studies was to SEE the Character of God in the text. I was tired of Bible Studies which made 'self' the focus and often led too quickly away from understanding in order to go unnecessarily deep into application, making scripture man focused rather than what it actually is: God focused. The Bible isn't about me, it is first and foremost a book about Him. When I get too busy looking for the nuggets I can hashtag on socials or plaster on a sign to feel good about, I miss really understanding WHO my God is and what He truly wants of me and calls me to do. It is the easy, fluffy Christianity which holds little real accountability vs. the hard, narrow-path TRUTH of a right faith calling us to be transformed. That being the case, every single passage should reveal an aspect of His

character. Studying with this in mind on my own has really opened my eyes and deepened my understanding of the God I love so much. I am excited to share this approach with you as well and I will provide space to react to these "God is..." thoughts if you would like to.

→ Finally, because this is a gratitude study and the key point I felt led to draw out is Paul's command to in <u>everything</u> by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God, I have arranged prayer prompts for you as you go to the Lord with a heart of gratitude... even if those things we are grateful for have to be dug out of the ashes. (Paul did say, in everything!) I encourage you to be specific (not general) and really own each prayer.



This study is arranged to cover 20 days: 5 days a week, Monday through Friday (ish... since November begins mid-week), between now and through Thanksgiving. However, please use it in whatever arrangement fits your schedule and desire for depth.

A great first-step I HIGHLY recommend: *the day before you start the study, read or listen to the entire book of Philippians, beginning-to-end*. Phone app stores have great Bible apps which can be used for audio. BibleGateway.com also has an audio option on your computer web browser. I'm often tired first thing in the morning when I do my study so, when I read text, I read along with an audio app to keep me focused and undistracted. A short 4 chapter book like Philippians shouldn't take more than 10 minutes in this way (you can even listen along while doing other tasks during the day!). Reading the book in its entirety helps you see the big picture before diving into the details. Also, for me, doing a dive in on Monday-Friday, I will usually take Sunday morning each week during my study to re-read the entire book again, to continue keeping scope in mind.

Recommended order of operations for each day of study:

PRAY 1st for Wisdom and understanding of the day's passage, then....

1st - Read the passage

2nd - Consider what it is *actually* saying (not what you *want* it to say). Most of the questions will draw from the actual words in scripture.

3rd – (Preferably, if you can...) Before you think about how to apply it to your life or what it means to you, consider how the original hearer of the word would have applied it to their life and what it meant to them. This is one way to keep scripture in context and, as you consider through this scope, really see how relatable it is to us today. This can be done with some Study Bible notes or online commentaries. BibleHub.com is a GREAT resource for this. (In my weekly posts on the blog I will try to outline some key points as we go.)

4th – Now you can lay the passage over your own life: Is there an area you need to apply or use
it? If you already are, praise God for His good guidance. If not, pray to seek His help in doing so.
This is where the "God is..." points and final prayer will give you more freedom to reflect on what and how God is showing you to apply what you studied.

My goal is to blog an article each Wednesday on a key point from the week of study and to share passages and thoughts daily on Instagram. Added Goodies

- I am attaching a page of blank leaves which you can use to fill-in with "I'm grateful for..." gratitude reminders. They can be printed and used as-is or cut out, colored, and hung around the house... you can even invite your family to find gratitude from each day's topic with you! Select to "print p.33" if you want only this page or multiple copies of it.
- I have also enclosed a page for Scripture memory cards if you would like to practice memorizing passages. You can insert card stock or regular paper into your printer and select to "print p.34" for as many copies as you need. Once printed, cut them apart to use alongside your study time



I hope you enjoy this study as much as I have enjoyed piecing it together. As with all other gratitude studies, I don't want this to just be something we dive into for the month of November. My prayer is that we might all form habits of gratitude, in *everything* (good, bad and all the rest in-between) which can continue beyond one season and one month.





Pray... with God as your witness... to thank Him specifically for those who you are grateful for in your life, especially those who are "partakers" with you in the gospel/in faith, whose love seems to abound. Also, pray FOR this person/these people that their love would abound more and more, with knowledge and all discernment.... And pray the same for yourself as you seek to grow in Christ.





God is transcending. His truth prevails regardless of what lies under the surface. (see v18, implied)


Pray... and thank God specifically for how and where you can see His Truth rising despite attempts by others to taint it or squash it out.

you lost and/or time you have now with someone who is encouraging you in the faith or who God has given you to encourage. You and they are still here for purpose... and those who are gone, are gone for purpose as well. It is hard to process but there is still gratitude to be found in the middle of it.


When believers stand firm, of one mind, side-by-side and not frightened, what is it a "clear sign" of? (v28)

And if you are frightened in current conflicts, pray for God's strength and peace to wash over you and thank Him ahead of time for the work you know He is doing.



Pray... thank God for the specific opportunities he gives you to serve others. Maybe recognize areas where this "service" isn't always what you would choose or very easy and use this time to pray for a positive servant-heart and gratitude for the lessons it is teaching you.

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This section is the type of passage which can make more sense with parallel reference (looking at other translations) and cross reference (using scripture to interpret scripture). 



If you feel as thought you have *not* been doing a good job of this, pray and thank God for opening your eyes to realize it and invite Him to help you do better, that He might be glorified as His light shines through you into the world around.



God is merciful, sparing hardships which may be too much to bear and sending people who can encourage when most needed. (see v27)

Pray... and thank God for specific mercies, including healings and/or people who He has sent at just the right time.

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This section may be a bit tricky to understand. While most of it is easy to infer, we can't help but scratch our heads at, for example, v2, "Look out for the dogs..." This could mean many things, but we want to be certain we understand it as *God intends*. So, take a moment today and read <u>Isaiah 56:9-11</u> for some contextual clarity:

What are the characteristics Isaiah uses when describing people as "dogs"?

Now back to Philippians

A little bit of commentary research tells us that there were "teachers" going around Philippi telling believers that, in order to really be saved, they had to be circumcised, literally, and they had to follow various Jewish customs. They were not considered, as we might say, 'Christian enough' if they didn't. (These are likely the same teachers he takes a jab at in v1:15-18)

Considering this it is easier to understand why Paul is listing off attributes and seeming as though he is bragging on himself in v3:5-6 (though he is not bragging). What traits does he list off as having "in the flesh"?


Paul is self-described and agreeably very Jewish. As a matter of fact, he points out, if salvation depended on Jewishness, he would be at the head of the line. BUT... does that matter to Paul? What does he say is all that counts? (v7b)______

God is sufficient. Nothing else is needed. He is all-in-all and to connect, we simply embrace His sufficiency. (see v7, implied)


Are there areas in your life where you have been trying to achieve or do to be "enough" for God? Are there areas where you have been like a "dog"; lazy about faith and prayer and following? Trust God's sufficiency and lean into Him to guide you and be all you need... obey his simple commands and know that is all He asks.

Today may have been a heavy day for some.... Others may feel they do not struggle in this area. If you are fully confident and not even a little convicted on this matter then I encourage you to consider people close to you in this light and how you might be praying for them.

Pray... and thank God for being sufficient. Find gratitude and relief in specific points of what you *get to* let go of... in what you don't have to *do* anymore to be in a personal relationship with Christ.

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Philippians ESV

Chapter 1

¹ Paul and Timothy, servants of Christ Jesus, To all God's holy people in Christ Jesus at Philippi, together with the overseers and deacons: ² Grace and peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

³ I thank my God every time I remember you. ⁴ In all my prayers for all of you, I always pray with joy ⁵ because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now, ⁶ being confident of this, that he who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus.

⁷ It is right for me to feel this way about all of you, since I have you in my heart and, whether I am in chains or defending and confirming the gospel, all of you share in God's grace with me. ⁸ God can testify how I long for all of you with the affection of Christ Jesus.

⁹ And this is my prayer: that your love may abound more and more in knowledge and depth of insight, ¹⁰ so that you may be able to discern what is best and may be pure and blameless for the day of Christ, ¹¹ filled with the fruit of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ—to the glory and praise of God.

¹² Now I want you to know, brothers and sisters, that what has happened to me has actually served to advance the gospel. ¹³ As a result, it has become clear throughout the whole palace guard and to everyone else that I am in chains for Christ. ¹⁴ And because of my chains, most of the brothers and sisters have become confident in the Lord and dare all the more to proclaim the gospel without fear.

¹⁵ It is true that some preach Christ out of envy and rivalry, but others out of goodwill. ¹⁶ The latter do so out of love, knowing that I am put here for the defense of the gospel. ¹⁷ The former preach Christ out of selfish ambition, not sincerely, supposing that they can stir up trouble for me while I am in chains. ¹⁸ But what does it matter? The important thing is that in every way, whether from false motives or true, Christ is preached. And because of this I rejoice.

Yes, and I will continue to rejoice, ¹⁹ for I know that through your prayers and God's provision of the Spirit of Jesus Christ what has happened to me will turn out for my deliverance. ²⁰ I eagerly

expect and hope that I will in no way be ashamed, but will have sufficient courage so that now as always Christ will be exalted in my body, whether by life or by death. ²¹ For to me, to live is Christ and to die is gain. ²² If I am to go on living in the body, this will mean fruitful labor for me. Yet what shall I choose? I do not know! ²³ I am torn between the two: I desire to depart and be with Christ, which is better by far; ²⁴ but it is more necessary for you that I remain in the body. ²⁵ Convinced of this, I know that I will remain, and I will continue with all of you for your progress and joy in the faith, ²⁶ so that through my being with you again your boasting in Christ Jesus will abound on account of me.

²⁷ Whatever happens, conduct yourselves in a manner worthy of the gospel of Christ. Then, whether I come and see you or only hear about you in my absence, I will know that you stand firm in the one Spirit, striving together as one for the faith of the gospel ²⁸ without being frightened in any way by those who oppose you. This is a sign to them that they will be destroyed, but that you will be saved—and that by God. ²⁹ For it has been granted to you on behalf of Christ not only to believe in him, but also to suffer for him, ³⁰ since you are going through the same struggle you saw I had, and now hear that I still

Chapter 2

Therefore if you have any encouragement from being united with Christ, if any comfort from his love, if any common sharing in the Spirit, if any tenderness and compassion, ² then make my joy complete by being like-minded, having the same love, being one in spirit and of one mind. ³ Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit. Rather, in humility value others above yourselves, ⁴ not looking to your own interests but each of you to the interests of the others.

⁵ In your relationships with one another, have the same mindset as Christ Jesus:

⁶ Who, being in very nature God,

did not consider equality with God something to be used to his own advantage;

⁷ rather, he made himself nothing

by taking the very nature of a servant,

- being made in human likeness.
- ⁸ And being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself

by becoming obedient to death even death on a cross!

⁹ Therefore God exalted him to the highest place and gave him the name that is above every name,

¹⁰ that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth,

¹¹ and every tongue acknowledge that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

¹² Therefore, my dear friends, as you have always obeyed—not only in my presence, but now much more in my absence—continue to work out your salvation with fear and trembling, ¹³ for it is God who works in you to will and to act in order to fulfill his good purpose.

¹⁴ Do everything without grumbling or arguing, ¹⁵ so that you may become blameless and pure, "children of God without fault in a warped and crooked generation." Then you will shine among them like stars in the sky ¹⁶ as you hold firmly to the word of life. And then I will be able to boast on the day of Christ that I did not run or labor in vain. ¹⁷ But even if I am being poured out like a drink offering on the sacrifice and service coming from your faith, I am glad and rejoice with all of you. ¹⁸ So you too should be glad and rejoice with me.

¹⁹ I hope in the Lord Jesus to send Timothy to you soon, that I also may be cheered when I receive news about you. ²⁰ I have no one else like him, who will show genuine concern for your welfare. ²¹ For everyone looks out for their own interests, not those of Jesus Christ. ²² But you know that Timothy has proved himself, because as a son with his father he has served with me in the work of the gospel. ²³ I hope, therefore, to send him as soon as I see how things go with me. ²⁴ And I am confident in the Lord that I myself will come soon.

²⁵ But I think it is necessary to send back to you Epaphroditus, my brother, co-worker and fellow soldier, who is also your messenger, whom you sent to take care of my needs. ²⁶ For he longs for all of you and is distressed because you heard he was ill. ²⁷ Indeed he was ill, and almost died. But God had mercy on him, and not on him only but also on me, to spare me sorrow upon sorrow. ²⁸ Therefore I am all the more eager to send him, so that when you see him again you may be glad and I may have less anxiety. ²⁹ So then, welcome him in the Lord with great joy, and honor people like him, ³⁰ because he almost died for the work of Christ. He risked his life to make up for the help you yourselves could not give me.

Chapter 3

3 Further, my brothers and sisters, rejoice in the Lord! It is no trouble for me to write the same things to you again, and it is a safeguard for you. ² Watch out for those dogs, those evildoers, those mutilators of the flesh. ³ For it is we who are the circumcision, we who serve God by his Spirit, who boast in Christ Jesus, and who put no confidence in the flesh—⁴ though I myself have reasons for such confidence.

If someone else thinks they have reasons to put confidence in the flesh, I have more: ⁵ circumcised on the eighth day, of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew of Hebrews; in regard to the law, a Pharisee; ⁶ as for zeal, persecuting the church; as for righteousness based on the law, faultless.

⁷ But whatever were gains to me I now consider loss for the sake of Christ. ⁸ What is more, I consider everything a loss because of the surpassing worth of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord, for whose sake I have lost all things. I consider them garbage, that I may gain Christ ⁹ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but that which is through faith in Christ—the righteousness that comes from God on the basis of faith. ¹⁰ I want to know Christ—yes, to know the power of his resurrection and participation in his sufferings, becoming like him in his death, ¹¹ and so, somehow, attaining to the resurrection from the dead.

¹² Not that I have already obtained all this, or have already arrived at my goal, but I press on to take hold of that for which Christ Jesus took hold of me. ¹³ Brothers and sisters, I do not consider myself yet to have taken hold of it. But one thing I do: Forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead, ¹⁴ I press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus.

¹⁵ All of us, then, who are mature should take such a view of things. And if on some point you think differently, that too God will make clear to you. ¹⁶ Only let us live up to what we have already attained.

¹⁷ Join together in following my example, brothers and sisters, and just as you have us as a model, keep your eyes on those who live as we do. ¹⁸ For, as I have often told you before and now tell you again even with tears, many live as enemies of the cross of Christ. ¹⁹ Their destiny is

destruction, their god is their stomach, and their glory is in their shame. Their mind is set on earthly things. ²⁰ But our citizenship is in heaven. And we eagerly await a Savior from there, the Lord Jesus Christ, ²¹ who, by the power that enables him to bring everything under his control, will transform our lowly bodies so that they will be like his glorious body.

Chapter 4

4 Therefore, my brothers and sisters, you whom I love and long for, my joy and crown, stand firm in the Lord in this way, dear friends!

² I plead with Euodia and I plead with Syntyche to be of the same mind in the Lord. ³ Yes, and I ask you, my true companion, help these women since they have contended at my side in the cause of the gospel, along with Clement and the rest of my co-workers, whose names are in the book of life.

⁴Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice! ⁵Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. ⁶Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. ⁷And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

⁸ Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable—if anything is excellent or praiseworthy—think about such things. ⁹ Whatever you have learned or received or heard from me, or seen in me—put it into practice. And the God of peace will be with you.

¹⁰ I rejoiced greatly in the Lord that at last you renewed your concern for me. Indeed, you were concerned, but you had no opportunity to show it. ¹¹ I am not saying this because I am in need, for I have learned to be content whatever the circumstances. ¹² I know what it is to be in need, and I know what it is to have plenty. I have learned the secret of being content in any and every situation, whether well fed or hungry, whether living in plenty or in want. ¹³ I can do all this through him who gives me strength.


¹⁴ Yet it was good of you to share in my troubles. ¹⁵ Moreover, as you Philippians know, in the early days of your acquaintance with the gospel, when I set out from Macedonia, not one church shared with me in the matter of giving and receiving, except you only; ¹⁶ for even when I was in

Thessalonica, you sent me aid more than once when I was in need. ¹⁷ Not that I desire your gifts; what I desire is that more be credited to your account. ¹⁸ I have received full payment and have more than enough. I am amply supplied, now that I have received from Epaphroditus the gifts you sent. They are a fragrant offering, an acceptable sacrifice, pleasing to God. ¹⁹ And my God will meet all your needs according to the riches of his glory in Christ Jesus.

²⁰ To our God and Father be glory for ever and ever. Amen.

²¹ Greet all God's people in Christ Jesus. The brothers and sisters who are with me send greetings.
²² All God's people here send you greetings, especially those who belong to Caesar's household.

²³ The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit. Amen.
